

# SPANISH VERB PENSAR CONJUGATION

## How to use the Spanish Verb Pensar

The verb Pensar is used to express a conclusion after you have heard the different points of view about a certain topic: Yo **pienso** que el partido Demócrata tiene una mejor plataforma política en este período. (I think that the Democratic Party has a better political platform this period.)

It is used to mention a habit, an obsession or constant situation a person holds: Algunas personas solo **piensan** en hacer dinero rápidamente. (Some people only think about making money as fast as possible.)

To state a prediction based on numbers or facts: Roger **piensa** que su país no ganará un lugar en el próximo mundial de fútbol. (Roger thinks his country will not win a space in the next Soccer World Cup.)

To talk about a memory that came to your mind: Estaba **pensando** en las vacaciones que pasamos en Venecia. (I was thinking about the holidays we spent in Venice.)

## Verbals of Pensar

Verbals are words that need other words in order to be used. No matter the person, tense, number, these words will remain the same (hooray!). The verb **Pensar** has three verbals: the infinitive, the gerund and the participle. Let's move on to the examples:

	Verbal	Common Use	Example	English
<b>Infinitive</b>	Pensar (to think / thinking)	Non conjugated / Noun	Pensar en ella todo el día es normal para un enamorado.	To think of her all day long is normal for a lover.
<b>Gerund</b>	Pensando (thinking)	Adverb/periphrasis	Sigue pensándolo y alguien más comparará la pieza.	Keep on thinking about it and someone else will buy the stuff.

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	Verbal	Common Use	Example	English
<b>Participle</b>	Pensado (thought)	Adjective	Eso fue pensado por Fibonacci hace más de cien años.	That was thought by Fibonacci more than a hundred years ago.

## Conjugate the Spanish Verb Pensar

Many Spanish teachers, and I include myself, strongly recommend having practical exercises with real conversations to obtain “naturalness” in the way of speaking.

## Pensar Conjugation: Indicative Mood

You have to consider the focus that is used when a person is speaking, what the verb or phrase is saying in general, and the most common focus in Spanish is the indicative mood. Although less common, please keep in mind that the auxiliary verb Haber (to have) is an important part of its compound tenses!

### Simple Tenses of the Indicative Mood

Subject	Present	Preterite	Imperfect	Conditional	Future
	(think)	(thought)	(thought)	(would think)	(will think)
<b>Yo</b>	pienso	pensé	pensaba	pensaría	pensaré
<b>Tú</b>	piensas	pensaste	pensabas	pensarías	pensarás
<b>Él/Ella/Usted</b>	piensa	pensó	pensaba	pensaría	pensará
<b>Nosotros</b>	pensamos	pensamos	pensábamos	pensaríamos	pensaremos
<b>Ellos/Ellas/Ustedes</b>	piensan	pensaron	pensaban	pensarían	pensarán

### Some examples:

- Pobre de ti que **pensabas** que aún sin entrenar podrías ganar el torneo. (Poor you who **thought** that even without training you could win the tournament.)
- Déjame leer los folletos y lo **pensaré** por unos días. (Let me read the brochures and I **will think** about it for a few days.)

### Compound Tenses of the Indicative Mood

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Subject	Present	Preterite	Imperfect	Conditional	Future
	(have/has thought)	(had thought)	(had thought)	(would have thought)	(will have thought)
<b>Yo</b>	he pensado	hube pensado	había pensado	habría pensado	habré pensado
<b>Tú</b>	has pensado	hubiste pensado	habías pensado	habrías pensado	habrás pensado
<b>Él/Ella/Usted</b>	ha pensado	hubo pensado	había pensado	habría pensado	habrá pensado
<b>Nosotros</b>	hemos pensado	hubimos pensado	habíamos pensado	habrían pensado	habremos pensado
<b>Ellos/Ellas/Ustedes</b>	han pensado	hubieron pensado	habían pensado	habrían pensado	habrán pensado

## Pensar Conjugation: Subjunctive Mood

With this mood, we hypothesize or express our wishes. The number of verb tenses is reduced, being divided equally into simple and compound.

### Simple Tenses of the Subjunctive Mood

Subject	Present	Imperfect	Imperfect 2	Future
<b>Yo</b>	piense	pensara	pensase	pensare
<b>Tú</b>	pienses	pensaras	pensases	pensares
<b>Él/Ella/Usted</b>	piense	pensara	pensase	pensare
<b>Nosotros</b>	pensemos	pensáramos	pensásemos	pensáremos
<b>Ellos/Ellas/Ustedes</b>	piensen	pensaran	pensasen	pensaren

### More examples:

- Si usted **pensara** que nuestra calidad es mala, no estaría hoy aquí. (If you **thought** our quality was bad, you would not be here today.)
- La idea de la campaña publicitaria es hacer que los niños **piensen** en nuestros dulces día y noche. (The idea of the publicity campaign is to have the children **think** of our candies night and day.)

### Compound Tenses of the Subjunctive Mood

Subject	Present	Imperfect	Imperfect 2	Future
<b>Yo</b>	haya pensado	hubiera pensado	hubiese pensado	hubiere pensado

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Subject	Present	Imperfect	Imperfect 2	Future
<b>Tú</b>	hayas pensado	hubieras pensado	hubieses pensado	hubieres pensado
<b>Él/Ella/Usted</b>	haya pensado	hubiera pensado	hubiese pensado	hubiere pensado
<b>Nosotros</b>	hayamos pensado	hubiéramos pensado	hubiésemos pensado	hubiéremos pensado
<b>Ellos/Ellas/Ustedes</b>	hayan pensado	hubieran pensado	hubiesen pensado	hubieren pensado

## Pensar Conjugation: Imperative Mood

We enter the last mood you are going to memorize, with fewer people to learn (fortunately): the bossy (or Imperative) mood. With this conjugation, you can express orders. And since you can't order yourself or a third party, you will only learn 3 persons and 1 verb tense. Possible uses of the Imperative mood? Children, pets, or that roomie who won't stop eating your stuff.

### Imperative Mood's Conjugations

Subject	Affirmative	Negative
	(think / let's think)	(don't think / let's not think)
<b>Tú</b>	piensa	no pienses
<b>Nosotros</b>	pensemos	no pensemos
<b>Ustedes</b>	piensen	no piensen

#### Examples:

**Pensemos** en todos los beneficios que esta autopista traerá a la comunidad. (**Let's think** about the benefits this highway will bring to the community.)

Será mejor que **no pienses** cosas malas antes de que pasen. (It would be better if you **don't think** of bad things before they happen.)

10. Para cuando llegue a Nebraska, ya lo \_\_\_\_\_ mejor. (The moment I arrive to Nebraska I would have thought about it better.)
